## Into "The Wilderness" with Kris Opat

In May, I had the opportunity to visit "The Wilderness", a creative and artistic evening service held at St. John's Cathedral in Denver, Colorado. "The Wilderness" was first brought to my attention by Lou+ in January. He visited St. John's for the ordination of his son Bret and had the opportunity to worship at "The Wilderness." When Lou+ told me about the service it piqued my interest and I began to consider how such a service could add to our already robust and diverse worship here at St. Paul's. Last month, I was able to experience it for myself.

The service began at 6:00 p.m. Sunday evening. Thin trails of incense caught the fading evening sun as it trickled through the beautiful stained glass windows of the cathedral. The lights inside were dimmed and the high altar was bathed in an inviting orange light. The altar was draped with a rich, textured fabric that hung loosely to the ground and the top of the altar was covered with flickering tea lights.

In the sanctuary, behind the celebrating priest, was a worship space where at any point in the service all were invited to wander and pray. There was space to meditate around the high altar; and in the choir area there was a free-standing table with candles, jars of oil mixed with myrrh, and pieces of cloth. At this worship station I was



invited to dip a piece of cloth into the scented oil and take it with me as an aromatic reminder of my time in this most holy place.

Behind the table for communion in the nave, a series of Easter images were projected on a sheer drape. Next to the table were large bowls of sand where we would later place our candles to burn as a reminder of the prayers of the people.

The music rarely stopped flowing during the service and it varied from hymns specially arranged for the night's worship to instrumental melodies offering a special ambiance. Although the service was no more than 45 minutes long, it was powerful, creative and compelling.

During my time in Denver, I not only had the opportunity to experience "The Wilderness" for myself, but also to meet with many of the clergy and lay people who have made "The Wilderness" a reality. I sat in on a couple planning sessions to see how everything fit together and what went into putting the service together.

This trip was a wonderful experience that will inform my ministry here at St. Paul's in creative and compelling ways. I am so thankful I was able to take this opportunity.



That said, we are still facing a big near-term challenge. We have to respond to what began as a \$100,000 shortfall in revenue in our \$800,000 budget. As is often the case with challenges, there is both good news and bad news. The good news is that, as of this writing, our deficit stands at \$59,000. This reduction is due primarily to additional pledges we have received since the start of the year, and contributions given to reduce the deficit. Having gone through our budget yet again, I believe it is possible to cut our expenditures by about \$15,000 without a major negative impact on our mission and ministries. This would reduce our deficit to \$44,000. The bad news is that a \$44,000 deficit is not sustainable given the modest size of our reserve funds. We are almost totally dependent on current giving to fund our programs and cover all of our costs.

The Vestry has approved the formation of a Deficit Reduction Committee, comprised of non-Vestry members, to come up with recommendations for closing the remaining budget gap. We have decided that it's time to reach out for new ideas for meeting this challenge. In the meantime, you can help by pledging if you have not yet done so, increasing your pledge if you feel called to do so, or by making a special contribution earmarked for reducing the deficit. I am very grateful for all of the pledges and special contributions that so many of you have already made, and I have great faith that the God of abundance will be with us as we seek to eliminate or significantly reduce our deficit.

## 2009 Budget Gap Update

In April's Messenger, I wrote a note providing an update on where we stood in terms of our projected budget deficit for 2009. Part of the plan mentioned in that note was for follow-up phone calls to be made to those parishioners who had not pledged as of then. In mid-April, several of my fellow Vestry members and I spent a couple of hours at the offices of Tedco (thanks to Jim Frantz) calling those on the list. We sent new pledge cards to a subset of those who were called, based on conversations during the calls.

Based on my request in April and on the response to the calls, we have realized additional pledges and special contributions to reduce the deficit. As a result, we currently stand at a projected deficit of \$59,000, which is much lower than where we started at \$100,000. We expect to receive additional pledges/contributions as a result of the calls in April. If you received a new pledge card, I kindly request that you complete it and return it with a pledge/contribution to St. Paul's as soon as possible.

At the May 18 Vestry meeting, your Vestry approved the formation of an Ad-hoc Deficit Reduction Committee in order to address the remaining deficit. This committee, composed of non-Vestry members, will study our current situation and make any recommendations that they feel are necessary to reduce or eliminate the remaining deficit. We want to hear ideas from a broader group within the parish to address this issue and are looking forward to the recommendations that will come out of that committee.

St. Paul's is very blessed, as you have heard from me before, and I thank everyone who has pledged and/or made a special contribution for 2009. I also want to encourage others to please consider helping as best you can so that we can continue to fully support our mission and ministry.

## First Annual student “Jazz Performance Camp” to be held at St. Paul’s

We are pleased to announce the intention to offer a fantastic student jazz performance camp at St. Paul’s. This week-long camp will be led by saxophone jazz artist, Lee Robinson, and facilitated by Dr. Doug Starr, St. Paul’s Director of Music & Arts, and Music Faculty Adjunct at Penn State University, New Kensington (PSUNK) with students from the PSUNK Jazz Ensemble. Young musicians aged 13-18 years old, i.e., middle school and high school students, are invited. The camp will be tailored for existing jazz or contemporary music ensembles—quartets, trios and quintets. Each ensemble member must register for the Jazz Performance Camp. 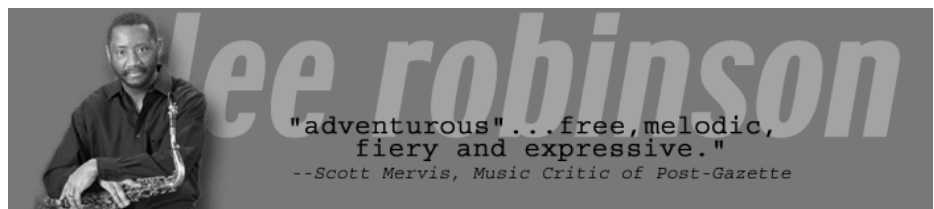

## Would you like to engage in a life-changing experience?

### Do you want to:

- study the Old and New Testaments in depth?
- learn more about church history and traditions?
- be able to discuss Christian theology with confidence?
- be able to reflect theologically on events in your life (past and present) in an effort to make sense of them?
- share your life-changing experiences with the others?

If so, please consider becoming a student in the Education for Ministry (EFM) program that will be begin again at St. Paul's in September. EFM is for all of us—not just future clergy. Anyone can benefit from the four-year program by sharing our experiences and by learning from one another as the course of study progress. The mentor is not meant to be a teacher or lecturer, but rather a facilitator in understanding and discussing the study materials. Having graduated from the EFM program here at St. Paul's nearly ten years ago, with Susan Steffen as our mentor, I recognize just how important it has been in my life outside of St. Paul's. As an attorney working with many difficult legal concerns, I have become aware of my other responsibilities as a Christian in dealing with my clients and others. Through what we call “theological reflection” I see events differently and find new meanings in them as they happen about me. You reflect on events—both small and great—theologically. It is an awakening of sorts—to be experienced—a new dimension you never thought about before. As a member of St. Paul's, my EFM experience has helped me better understand the workings of the Christian church generally, and helps me appreciate our denomination as we participate with other Christian denominations in our ministries. As a direct result of your studies, your perspective may change on those events ongoing within our denomination and the Christian church at large. You may find that you want to participate more actively in the life of your parish church or in the diocese. We each have an important role –a ministry to offer to others. You may find you have a “ministry” you have only casually thought about in the past but never felt confident enough to become active. If you want to know more about being a Christian and are willing to read the assigned materials, actively participate during each session and come one evening per week from September through May (a regular academic year) attending a challenging, life-changing program, EFM is the place for you. For more information, please contact Fr. Lou, Susan Steffen, our EFM mentor, or me, the future assistant mentor. Don't miss out on this memorable experience!

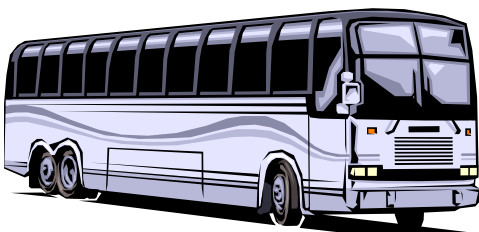

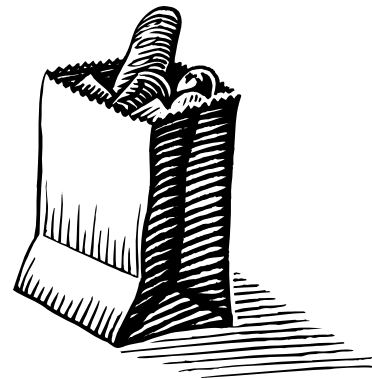
## With Gratitude

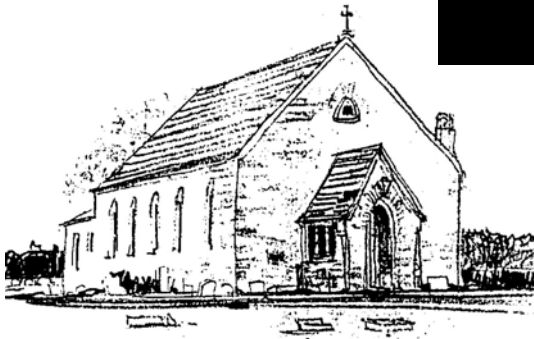

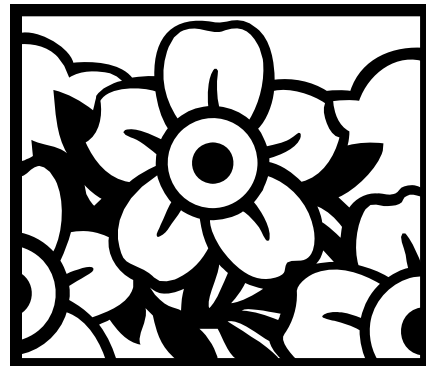
