MUSIC NOTES

Beethoven is the first composer to live off his publications and premieres- the working man composer. He is also the first composer to believe that no other could compose music as great as his. It was a new age. The ruling courts and dominance of the church were passing away.. Princely kingdoms and their roster of courtly composers were being overturned by revolution. Beethoven was on his own! At the offertory the choir sings an arrangement of his hymn based on Psalm 14. It is explicit in its harmonic coloring of a colorful text- Its dynamics range from soft to suddenly loud. Beethoven was a human force to be encountered. You can never turn away from his musical presence!

At the communion, Susan Vines sings a fascinating composition by Theodore Chanler. He was an American composer born in 1902, who studied with French composer, Nadia Boulanger, and taught at Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore, MD. He was not a prolific composer, but lavished great care over the songs he wrote. The song, One of Us, takes the perspective of an orphaned child, newly adopted, who senses the new parents are overwhelmed – “Why do you fear us, freeze us out of your heart? One of us was God? Has this not been told abroad, To some by song,...To some by star? This touching poem text is by Leonard Feeney.


