The Creed

For sanitary reasons, we ask you not to dip the host in the wine. If someone with you would like communion brought to them, please let a greeter know.

Healing Prayer

Before or after receiving Communion, you are invited to go to one of the two prayer stations on either side of the altar for laying on of hands and prayers for healing. You may ask for a prayer for yourself, someone you care for, or a general prayer. You may stand or sit for prayer. Music Notes

Today is the first Sunday after Epiphany, and we celebrate both the Baptism of Christ and the Epiphany revelation to the Gentiles. The latter is reflected in our closing hymn and two organ settings of the same hymn tune: Wie schön leuchtet, or "How bright appears the morning star." It must have been a very popular 16th and 17th century Reformation hymn. Bach's harmonization of the hymn tune that we sing today is from his very first cantata, and the organ settings by Pachelbel and Buxtehude are "cantus firmus" organ chorale settings with the ever-ascending chorale melody in the uppermost voice (Pachelbel) and the bass pedal (Buxtehude).

Throughout the season after Epiphany, the choir will sing choral anthems based on the Lectionary Psalms. Today we sing a setting of Psalm 29 by Heinrich Schütz, a predecessor to and foundational influence on Pachelbel, Buxtehude, Bach, and many other German Baroque composers. Schütz compositions for organ and for choir and soloists in cantatas and oratorios set the standard for German organists and composers. Sung at the Offertory, "Bringt her dem Herren" is a song of praise alternating between the soloist and short "alleluia" choruses.

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The altar flowers are given, to the glory of God, in loving memory of Stephen M. Delano and Virginia Albright.
